Environmental Education is the cornerstone of Orca K-8. Each grade takes part in the Seward Park Audubon Nature Connection program. Students go to camp at Indianola and NatureBridge. Sixth grade spends time in the garden classroom cooking, eating, connecting to food justice, and culture.



Middle school students need outdoor time for health and well being. At Orca K-8 students spend time outside each day. They enjoy the meandering track, nature council ring, and rain garden. They play sports. They spend time in the garden.

Academic Excellence

It is a social justice issue to make sure that every Orca K-8 student has 21st Century Learning skills to communicate and succeed in their world. At Orca K-8 you will find teachers helping students hone their skills and discover a myriad of ways to express themselves.

Science and Math are hands-on, investigative and empowering. Students examine real world problems and engage in inquiry-based investigations of natural phenomena. They explore, discover, discourse, make mistakes, and build their own body of knowledge. Education is not the filling of a pail, but the lighting of a fire. All eighth graders take Algebra 1.

Social & Environmental Justice Academy

The Social and Environmental Justice Academy in middle school is led by Ms. Jeanetta Murray and Mr. Tafuta Fundisha-Bey. The focus of the academy is looking at the world the way it is and discussing ways our scholars can make a difference. We emphasize that students are Agents of Change. Multiple strategies are in place to help all our scholars succeed. Students participate in debates and meaningful discussions, learn new vocabulary, read and write about current events, and engage in building stronger communities. Our goal is to help our scholars become the Agents of Change we believe them to be.

The Film Academy

The Orca Film Academy has partnered with The Film School and the Seattle Repertory Theater to help create a unique experience for students to learn history and language arts through the lens of a filmmaker. There are a number of community members who are supporting the academy too. Stacey Adams, a former Executive for Criminal Minds and the Big Bang Theory will teach students screenwriting, producing, and allow students to peek behind the scenes.

Students and seniors get to know each other at Esperanza House where they learn from one another, creating poetry, film, memories and gardens.

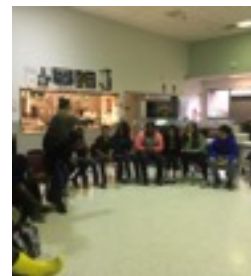
FIELD TRIPS

We have always maintained a great relationship with our local food bank Rainier Valley Food Bank– it is a critical food lifeline in our community. They are aiming for 10,000 cans & packages a year!

Leadership

STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Orca K-8 Student Government is an elective chosen by students or recommended by teachers. They plan the Pep Assemblies, Spirit Weeks, dances, socials, and publish the school Yearbook. They attend PTSA meetings and learn leadership skills and public speaking. They are working toward being accepted to We Day. This year they have chosen to explore homelessness in our community and are implementing a service-learning project at a Women's Shelter.

WE APP (Act, Present, Perform)

In this powerful elective, under the guidance of Toyia T. Taylor our students develop their artistic voice so that they can write and speak their truth as it relates to equity, privilege, gender, diversity, race and so much more!

RACE FORUM

Middle school students are encouraged to participate in the monthly Race Forum where families, staff and middle school students gather together, build relationships, listen, reflect and act on race and equity issues. Race Forum can lead to personal growth as well as systemic changes at our own school and in our community.
